La Boucherie Grand Prix, IV, 11-12-72, French Quarter, New Orleans, 35 Mile Criterium.

Spokes sparkled in the last rays of Sunday sunshine and the roar of New Orleans bicycle racing fans rebounded off aged French Quarter walls as the La Boucherie Grand Prix IV ended with a national champion being beaten by a local rider's furious sprint.

John Howard, national champion in 1968 and 1972, lost to local cyclist Jim Montgomery in the senior event, a 35 mile race.

Howard, of Springfield, Mo., finished third and Dale Blundell of Texas placed second.

The course began at Conti and Chartes, proceeded to St. Peter then to Royal and south to Iberollie where the speeding bikes turned to Chartes and the finish opposite the sponsoring La Boucherie restaurant.

Serious cycling started at 1 p.m. with the Amateur Men event consisting of the five laps. John and Philip Bartle, brothers from Florida, took first and second respectively. Robert Schrammel took 3rd.

Next was the Amateur Women event in which bicycling lassies pedaled five laps competing for the prize. Miss Eva Pfaff took the top slot, Peggy Keil took second honors and Miss Sylvia Sabo took 3rd.

In the Brass Celebrity event, Alec Sifford, news anchor of WYES-TV, got back at the appearing (how?)

finish the 3 lap event.

Walter Kane, representing the Fairmont Hotel, finished in first place. Malcom... WYUS placed second and Richard Dalton... the third spot.

The 1/2 of A novice-jr. race, a 10-mile event, was won by Chris Schrammel. Bennet Anderson placed second and Gary Sinkus placed third. Both Anderson and Sinkus are Florida cyclists.

By the time the ABL of A Senior event started the crowd was tense with anticipation and the 35 mile event featuring Howard, and a veritable mob of local riders and cyclists from outside La.

Celebrities were on hand to view the European-flavored competition. Jazz musician Pete Fountain awarded prizes in all events, and writer Truman Capote wandered to the front of the crowd to applaud Howard on several laps.

Doug Haddock, vice president of the New Orleans Bicycle Club, announced the event, explaining cycling strategy ~~to the front of the~~ and giving anecdotes concerning many of the competitors.

The riders usually take turns in the lead, he said, so that all major competitors will have the advantage of less wind resistance.

Even as Haddock was announcing the race practice, however, Howard had sprinted far out in front of the "pack" of riders. After several laps there were two packs and many stragglers but Howard was still far out in front, nearly 20 seconds ahead of his nearest competitor.

Grim-faced and straining he kept up a fantastic pace to the delight and amazement of onlookers until there were precious few remaining laps in the race.

A bicycle crash at Iberville and Royal Streets disabled a few bikes but there were no injuries reported. One cyclist reported: "an old man, probably a drunk" had wandered onto the course and was grazed by a speeding bike on either side. Soon a pileup of two-wheelers and riders had developed. The cyclist said the man had apparently been unaware that there was a race going on.

In fact throughout the afternoon pedestrians approached the course and talked with amazement of the bicycles having right of way on the historic streets. But the pileup did not deter Howard. His churning legs, still catapulted himself far in front of his fellows. But with less than 10 laps remaining a ripple of conversation went through the crowd. "Howard's falling back," they said. "The others are catching him. With only 10 to go Howard fell behind another rider to rest in his wake. The excited crowd watched the Iberollie St. intersection for the first glimpse of the cyclist in the fading light.

crowd was roaring. Howard had been beaten, and it seemed unbelievable. The street lights came on just in time for the judges to read the top ten in the event.

Placing 4th to 10th respectively were: Jim McFadden, Dave Weatherly, Chris Todd, Mike Schrammel, Skip Sparry, Kim Papageorge, and Don Lagrone.

Prizes consisted of expense money for the top ten riders (50 dollars each), and \$350 in awards. In addition \$200 in prizes were given in the form of dinners at French Quarter restaurants. "Primes" it was explained, are prizes given to the winners of individual laps. Thus riders are encouraged to put greater effort into the race.

Howard won most of the primes.

(Ed. note: John Howard was able to jump away from the gun partly because he balanced against the barricade—which is legitimate; Papageorge was able to get his wheel, but soon burned off. John dangled in front for eight laps, and then stretched his lead to 30 seconds. He was able to maintain that lead until the last ten laps (the race was 45 laps long). The chasers had difficulty in reeling John in because the bunch—consisting of 12 riders—would splinter going through the treacherous corners; also there were many in the field who would either take slow turns, or would not take any at all, and would allow gaps to open in the pace line. When the chase group was reduced to 4 riders, the gap slowly whittled down. Jim Montgomery rode very strong in the pack, and frequently tried to break, but was reeled in on the corners (!). In the sprint Del Blondale was the first through the last corner, followed by Montgomery, Howard, and McFadden. Unfortunately, he got caught behind the motorcycle officer and had to slow and swerve, enabling Montgomery to swing around. John was simply shattered from his solo time trial effort; his performance gave the enthusiastic crowd a lot to talk about.

Doug Haddock did a first class job in announcing the race, according to many reports. His continual monologue not only kept the crowd informed, but also amused with his bike aphorisms and anecdotes.

This year's race was the best organized La Boucherie Grand Prix yet. The sponsors were pleased by the large turnout of riders (97 in all classes), and anticipate a bigger race next year.

Special thanks to the NOBC and OWBC riders who monitored the corners (especially Jim Hayes whose authoritarian voice kept everyone in line). Also, a thank you to Catherine McFadden for a professional job in registering riders, as well as a good job on the numbers.)
